Course Objectives:

The objectives of the course are to further develop the students' English listening and speaking skills and fluency and to encourage students to practice English speaking through role play, discussions, conversations, and presentations.

Method:

1. Speaking: Classroom activities (2 periods per week)

To Further develop students' speaking abilities, students will have guided and free practice of a number of skills and patterns from a variety of real life situations. These skills include: retelling stories, expressing and defending opinions, acting out conversations, interviews and role-plays, conducting surveys, interviewing people, and presenting and summarizing findings.

2 Listening: Lab activities (2 periods per week):

To further develop English listening skills and improve pronunciation, students will perform the following activities:

- Pronunciation practice: focus on skills and problem areas for non-native speakers such as tongue twisters, word stress of phrasal verbs, stress on two-syllable words, vowel alternation, stress-changing suffixes, reductions, and highlighting important words.
- Listening comprehension: listening for main ideas as well as details, summaries, taking detailed notes, paraphrasing main ideas, interpreting speaker's tone and attitude, identifying main ideas, and synthesizing information from two listenings.


